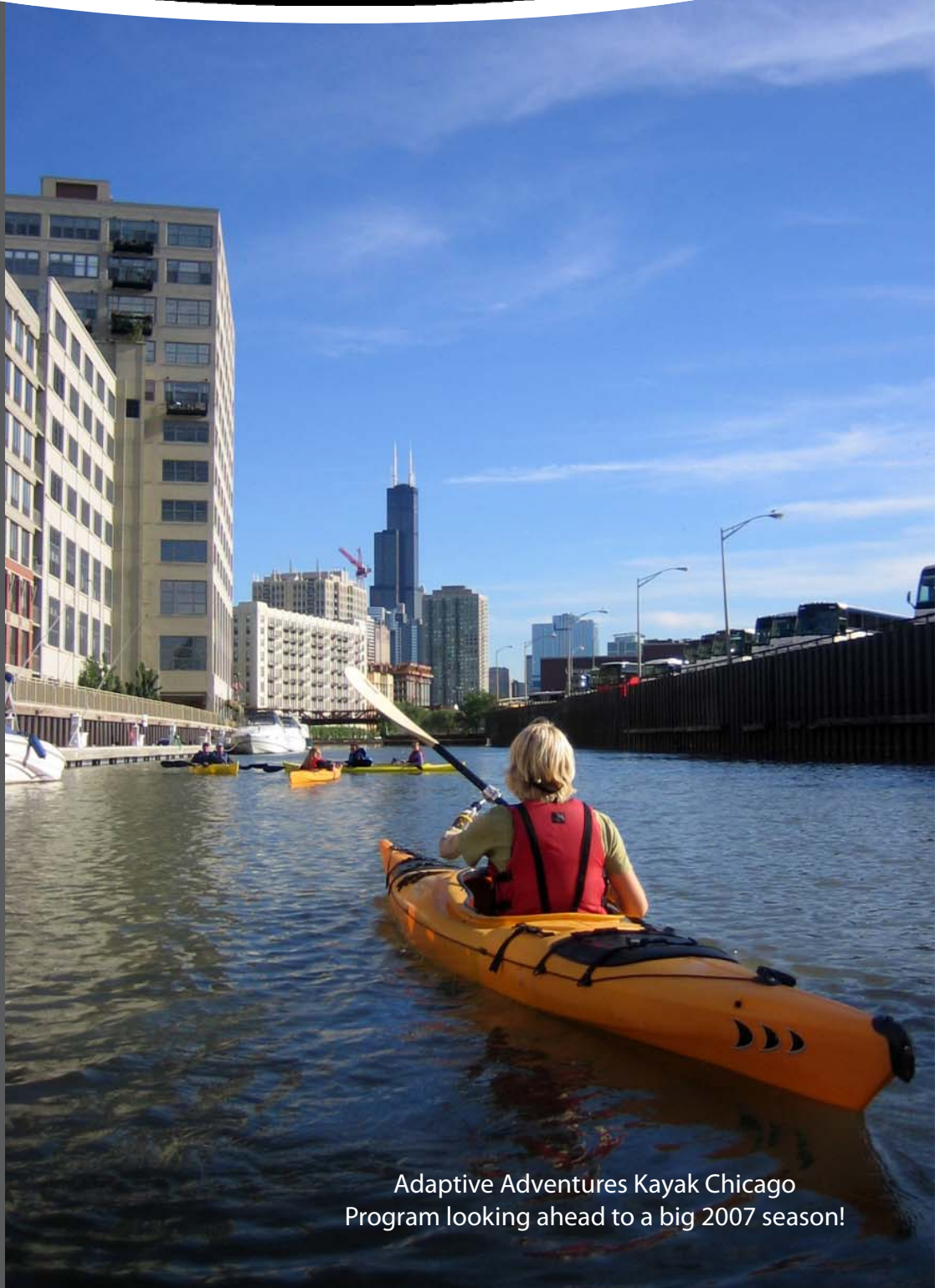

Greetings from Adaptive Adventures,
 We just finished our best winter ever with lots of familiar and new faces joining us on many different adventures in the Colorado Rockies and beyond. As usual, we added some new opportunities highlighted by an armed forces ski event in Keystone and several exciting school presentations. The high point of my winter was the STARS Kids Ski Camp in Vail, where kids, families, and volunteers joined for some magical moments.

As the weather warms, we are putting away the mono-skis, outriggers, and bibs and looking forward to a very busy summer season! In 2000, our program was based out of a closet at my house where we did about 200 lessons over the course of the year. Now, eight years later, we are expecting to provide over 3,500 lessons this year to participants and volunteers from our local communities, across the nation, and beyond. Presently, we have over 160 program days nationwide and thousands of lives have been impacted.

Yet, our work is far from over. We continue to face new challenges to create and fund progressive programs. This year, we will continue to focus on increased participation for many groups including recently injured armed forces personnel and kids.

Despite this extraordinary growth, quality, safety and most of all, fun still define our programs. We have always believed that the variety of experiences that we offer not only get participants and volunteers out for some great adventures, but bring them to a place where they are not defined by their disability. Programs that promote self-confidence, fitness, motivation and friendships are what generate the hope that our dreams can come true. Every day the staff and volunteers of Adaptive Adventures reach out and touch the lives of people with disabilities and their friends and families. Through our web sites, newsletter, camps, clinics, and presentations, we provide a range of direct services that help to rebuild lives and bring forth a better community.

Moving forward in our mission, we will continue to develop new programs and participants in different areas. Bringing programs to people is what Adaptive Adventures is all about! I truly hope that you join us at one of our exciting programs this year and help us celebrate the human spirit.

Adaptive Sports for Kids (ASK) Program



Adaptive Adventures ASK program has grown from one 2-day Stars of Tomorrow camp in 2001 into an all season multi-sport program in 2007. Each year, the participants and programs offered continue to reach a greater number of kids. With continued funding and volunteer support from organizations like Daniels Fund, Maggie George Foundation, McGowen Charitable Fund, Pulte Mortgage, SPRINT, and others our youth programs have come a long way in recent years.

ASK gives children an opportunity to achieve what they thought impossible. Through involvement in sports and recreation, these children learn that "if I can do this...I can do anything." ASK transports kids from the sidelines of life to ride, glide, paddle, and play sports that previously existed only in their dreams.

Adaptive Adventures STARS camp still exists, but today our ASK program now works annually with over 300 disabled children, hundreds of mainstream children, and provides in excess of 1000 kid's program lessons each year. This past year, we offered three youth-specific summer sports camps, one STARS ski camp, school presentations, and numerous day clinics incorporating kids with disabilities.

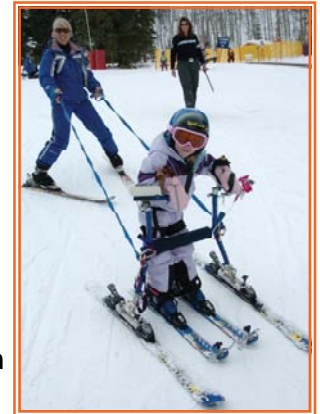

The snow was buttery-fresh, moving softly beneath the fat powder skis as skiers and riders with a variety of disabilities carved through the Champagne™ powder conditions on Steamboat Ski Area. "This is going to be another great camp," return participant Dave Lewis says while getting into Steamboat Adaptive's dual-ski. In just one season, Dave has advanced from tethered-assistance with local instructor Charlie Phelan to skiing independently. Lewis' goal is to monoski at next year's camp and ride the backcountry powder with the rest of the group.

For Adaptive Adventures, old pros at organizing adventure-sport camps for people with disabilities, Steamboat's Vectra Bank All Mountain Ski Camp could be just another stop on their circuit. But between Steamboat's outpouring of generosity, its amazing snow conditions, the unique sponsorship of backcountry specialists Steamboat PowderCats, and the local help Adaptive Adventures receives from co-sponsors Access Anything, this new addition to their All Mountain Camp Series is quite the contrary.

"We've been doing all mountain camps for seven years," states Joel Berman, Adaptive Adventures executive director and three-track skier due to an above-knee amputation. "For years we've wanted to come to Steamboat. Since we've teamed up with Access Anything, things have really come together. Steamboat and the community have been so friendly and interested in supporting the ski camp." Berman went on to state that Steamboat's camp has already become one of the most supported camps in their series, and its goal is to become the best of its kind in the country.



Unable to call it a "powder" camp because of obvious varying snow conditions, Steamboat's All Mountain camp does lean towards just that focus however. So far, at both camps- last year's inaugural and this year's second annual camp- participants were blessed with plenty of new snow and excellent skiing conditions to hone their powder skills. With a final day in the untracked backcountry of nearby Buffalo Pass, with PowderCats, it's evident what the underlying focus of this camp is: Powder.

The camp participants are intermediate and advanced level riders when tackling the groomed terrain of a ski resort, but skiing the powder is very different. Just ask former US Disabled Ski Team member, Bob Emerson. "Bob is one of the best three-track skiers I know," Berman stated as he watched Emerson slowly make his way through ten inches of untracked powder back to the snowcat." (continued on page 10)

Rafting Program Adds New Trips

New this year is a second multi-day wilderness rafting trip from June 20-25 to the Desolation/Gray stretch of the Green River. Hidden away are numerous rapids,



pristine beaches, and cool cottonwood glens. The views include spectacular redrock canyon walls, spires, arches, and balanced rocks. This area is some of the most breathtaking desert canyon territory in the country.

Native American ruins and historical sites are found along the way and the area also features Fremont Indian pictographs, abandoned homesteads, and shadow-filled grottoes.

He was one of the first kids at the Stars of Tomorrow Summer Camp to water-ski without outriggers attached to the ski. "After water-skiing with Adaptive Adventures for two years, I'm able to cut back and forth across the wake and I'm working on getting good enough to get air off the wake," said Pierce. From the looks of things, he may take off and never come down.

8th Annual Rocky Mountain Omnium - NEW DATES...June 15-17, 2007

For the past seven years, Adaptive Adventures has developed and managed the nation's largest integrated cycling event, the Rocky Mountain Omnium (RMO). Last year, the event hosted over 675 riders of all ages and abilities. As the event and Adaptive Adventures have grown, it has become apparent that the resources of Adaptive Adventures are best utilized in the growth of integrated cycling on recreational and grassroots levels. At the same time, Adaptive Adventures has the desire to continue the development of the RMO and help US Handcycling further its mission and goals.

Therefore, 2007 marks the first year of a four-year partnership between Adaptive Adventures and US Handcycling. Under this collaboration, US Handcycling will take over the management and organization of all competitive aspects of the RMO, and will replace Adaptive Adventures as the lead promoter for the event. Adaptive Adventures will continue to support competitive efforts and all phases of the RMO, but will focus the majority of its resources on developing and managing the recreational and grassroots aspects of the event.

The recreational side of the RMO will again include a comprehensive clinic. In addition, Adaptive Adventures will be looking to increase other riding opportunities and community outreach surrounding the event. "Our programs cater to athletes of all ages and abilities," noted Adaptive's Program Director, Matt Feeny. "Cycling, like all of our outdoor sports programs, is ideal for people with disabilities to keep up health, enhance fitness, and increase self-confidence. By devoting less resources to the RMO, we

will be able to provide more grass roots opportunities through camps, clinics, rides, and tours throughout the year as well as to help to further the mission of US Handcycling," commented Feeny.

New to the RMO this year, U.S. Paralympics will manage the World Championship Team selection trials [for all disability groups] in Denver this June. We are proud to have US Paralympics recognize and support the RMO. It will be an awesome opportunity for local riders to meet and ride with some of the best cyclists in the world.

In addition to the group of more than a dozen sit-skiers, this year's camp had over 30 participants including skiers with vision impairments, three-track and four track skiers, and an assortment of arm and leg amputees. Six of the participants, sponsored by the Boeing Company, the Wounded Warrior Disabled Sports Program, and the Steamboat community were soldiers recently wounded in Iraq and Afghanistan. Adaptive Adventures' All Mountain series is supported by Disabled Sports USA and the Wounded Warrior Project, bringing recently wounded veterans to the camps to improve their abilities and quality of life. Among the list of veterans at Steamboat's camp was Edward "Ted" Wade, who returned from Baghdad three years ago, after losing most of his right arm in a roadside bombing.

As with many of the soldiers' families at this camp, Wade's wife, Sarah, participated in the camp as well. Mrs. Wade stated that "the camp gave Ted's confidence a big boost that will certainly carry over to his continuing rehab." As with all skiers with disabilities, the Wades have set high goals for Ted, including their current goal "to be able to ski independently next winter. Steamboat was a big leap forward," Sarah explained.

Representing the Wounded Warrior Project was Ed Salau, who lost his left leg to grenade fire in 2004 in Iraq. Salau's attitude throughout the camp was extremely positive, and he was very grateful for the opportunities that camps such as these provide. His positive attitude was extremely contagious to the rest of the camp.

"Military medicine is wonderful and great. They can teach me how to walk, but how do they show me how to get that first date again or win a job interview? There's got to be that next step; that next thing that gets us plugged back into society," Salau said. "We find that in skiing." Three-tracker Bob Emerson, representing Disabled Sports USA, is a regular volunteer and Advisory board member of Adaptive Adventures, and agrees that "skiing gives you such freedom of motion and the speed you don't get in everyday life."

Steamboat helps to bring these goals to fruition with an amazingly supportive community that started welcoming skiers of all abilities long before Steamboat Ski Area was formed in 1964. Steamboat's adaptive ski program was started just twelve years later in 1976, and although it is still one of the smallest programs in the state, Access Anything, Adaptive Adventures, and a newly forming non-profit STARS (Steamboat Training Adaptive Recreational Sports), all hope to bring more awareness to the Steamboat area for skiers and travelers with disabilities.



The camp also attracted a title sponsor, Vectra Bank of Steamboat, for the first time. Their financial support played a key role in sponsoring many of the camp's participants. Bank President Dave Bruni was thrilled when he heard about the opportunity to support the camp. At the camp's final banquet, Bruni stated, "I feel it's an honor to support this camp and to ski with all you participants. This is a wonderful opportunity, and I just appreciate the chance to be a part of it." This kind of local support runs deep throughout the community, as local business owners donated money, lodging, food, services, instruction, and lift tickets to the camp. "We could never run a successful camp like this without the outpouring of help from the community and the continued support of the Steamboat Ski Area and all of our sponsors," according to long-time local and monoskier Craig Kennedy.



Program Spotlight: Great Lakes Adaptive Sports (GLASA) - "Let no one sit on the sidelines."

Great Lakes Adaptive Sports Association provides integrative, recreational and competitive sports opportunities for youth and adults who have a primary physical or visual impairment. A continuum of programs ranging from the developmental to the elite athlete is offered throughout the greater Chicagoland area including ambulatory and wheelchair golf, basketball, tennis, track, field, swim, floor hockey, aerobics, and power soccer.

TEAM GLASA is comprised of juniors ages 6 through 21 who compete in local and regional meets to qualify for the week long competition at the National Junior Disabled Championships. GLASA had 11 athletes that qualified in 2006, with 5 athletes traveling to Tampa for this prestigious national event. Funded through the Chicago Woman's Foundation and the Woman's Sports Foundation, GLASA's "Girls only" Go Girl Go program provides monthly sports activities and the implementation of a curriculum focusing on such topics as self-esteem, goal setting, nutrition, positive body image and others. Wherever possible, GLASA utilizes peers and role models who have physical impairments and strives to challenge individuals to the best of their ability, working with school and sports programs for inclusion. Don't miss out on GLASA's / Adaptive Adventures weeklong adaptive sports camp which offers wheelchair tennis, basketball, softball, track, kayaking, fishing, horseback riding and many other sports activities. Athletes from U of I Champaign, UW-Whitewater and other elite athletes and Paralympians assist with the camp.

In addition to the large offering of daily, year-round sports and recreation activities, GLASA also offers many social activities, equipment lending closet, camp, clinics and a strong support system. www.GLASA.org

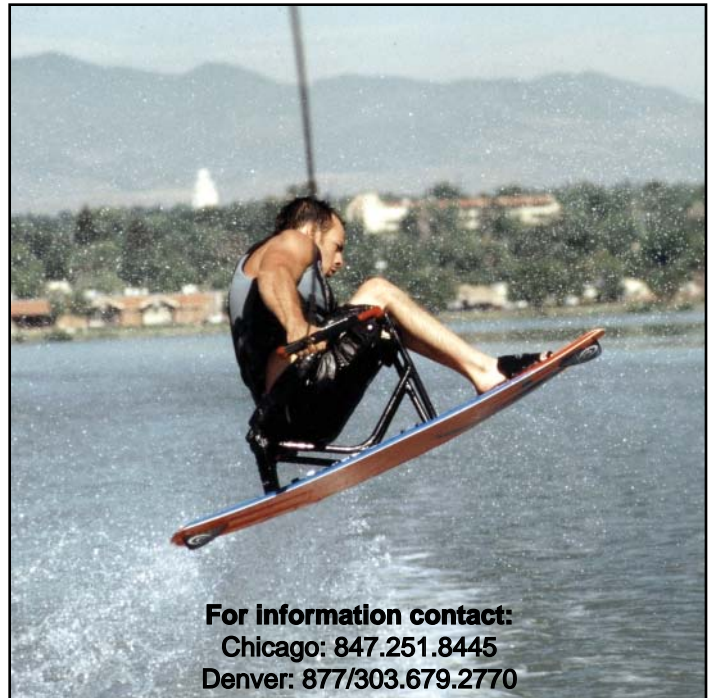
