Hitting the Slopes: 2007 Adaptive Adventures All Mountain Ski Camps

The 2007 ski season looks to be the biggest and best ever for the Adaptive Adventures All Mountain Camp Series. These specialty camps are designed for intermediate and advanced skiers with physical disabilities to push their limits, improve their ski skills, and establish new friendships.

Featured events in the 2006-2007 series include the annual Vail All Mountain camp, "Discover Ability" youth ski camp, Sarah Will Monoski Camp, and Steamboat All Mountain camp, which features Powdercat skiing on the final day of the event. Sponsored by Steamboat Powdercats, the trip enables skiers of all abilities to access some of the most pristine back country in Colorado, to ski on fresh snow that would normally be off-limits to skiers, making for a very unique experience.

In addition to these marquee events, Adaptive Adventures will continue to support other organizations throughout the country to create and enhance similar ski camps. This year, collaborations will include the 7th Annual "Expand Your Horizons" ski camp in Telluride, hosted by Telluride Adaptive Sports, and the 4th Annual Great Lakes Monoski Madness Camp, hosted by Courage Duluth. For these two camps, Adaptive Adventures will provide organizational and technical assistance to improve overall participation and quality. Throughout the ski season, Adaptive also offers resources to a number of other specialty ski events by providing instructors, volunteers, equipment, and administrative assistance.

"What originally began as one collaborative camp in Telluride has since turned into a defined product with growing demand by adaptive skiers from across the country. As the camps have grown, we have started to include a wider range of disabled individuals such as men and women of the armed forces and children," said Matt Feeney, Adaptive's ski school director. "If it's not one of our four marquee events, Adaptive's involvement varies from event to event and includes arranging transportation, soliciting donors, recruiting participants, offering instructors and volunteer assistance, and providing adaptive ski equipment."

Feeney co-founded Adaptive Adventures in 1999 with Joel Berman, who currently serves as the organization's executive director. Both men know first-hand the importance of increasing awareness and participation in disabled sports and outdoor recreational events. "Matt and I are able to put together a camp for adaptive athletes through the eyes, mindset, and experiences of individuals living with physical challenges. This makes our All Mountain camps a one-of-a-kind experience," said Berman.

Early on, Berman and Feeney believed offering ski camps would be a great way for adaptive skiers to improve their skills as well as meet individuals facing similar challenges in a fun, social setting. "If you get the right people in the right setting, everyone feeds off each other and pushes one another to be better. There's just a lot of camaraderie and spirit at the camps between skiers of all abilities, including newly injured veterans, individuals born with a disabilities and all of the staff and volunteers," said Feeney.

Unlike developmental ski camps that focus mainly on racing, Adaptive's All Mountain camps highlight high-end recreational skiing, and concentrate on skill development while seeking a variety of terrain and conditions. The focus of Adaptive's All Mountain Camps is more on technique and adaptability rather than speed! "Many ski areas offer wonderful beginning programs in adaptive skiing, but we try to take our participants' skiing experience to the next level by creating a truly unique experience for participants, volunteers, and the community," added Feeney.

Taking the camps "to the next level" is done through the use of top level coaches and skiers, with and without disabilities. This season's camps will feature top names such as: Sarah Will (13-time Paralympic Gold Medalist), Greg Mannino (Gold Medalist and World Champion), Bob Emerson (ex-member of USDST), Dan Metivier (ex-member USDST), and Kevin Jardeen (ex-coach USDST). In addition, all of the camps feature disabled skiers from around the United States, including 35-year-old, Iraq-war Veteran Ed Salau, a resident of North Carolina.

In 2004, Salau lost his left leg while serving our country. While recovering at the Walter Reed Medical Center, he learned about the AA All Mountain camps through a brief distributed to patients at the center. Six weeks after his injury, Salau was in Vail skiing for the first time at the Vail All Mountain camp, without so much as a prosthetic leg or any previous skiing experience.

"Thanks to Adaptive Adventures, I was introduced to adaptive snow skiing, and I've have had the awesome opportunity to get the wind back in my face and have a blast doing it," said Salau. "The reason that I will keep coming to the camps is that we are taught advanced techniques and receive personalized training like every other able-bodied person."

Adaptive Adventures' All Mountain camps welcome disabled members of the military, both young and old. Several of the camps raise money specifically to sponsor the participation of disabled armed forces members and their families. Adaptive Adventures also provides resources to national disabled veterans at events such as The Disabled American Veterans Winter Sports Clinic and the Hartford Ski Spectacular.

Thanks to many sponsors, volunteers, Adaptive Adventures, and Access Anything, Steamboat's 1st annual Adaptive Wakeboard and Waterski Camp was deemed a huge success! Over a dozen water skiers and wakeboarders with disabilities tested their abilities on Bald Eagle Lake, Steamboat's only private waterski lake. The lake was donated by Steamboat resident Ed MacArthur of Native Excavating.

Steamboat's public support and welcoming attitude towards these adventurers enabled participants to spend two full days on the lake. Beginners learned the basics of skiing and boarding while the more experienced had the opportunity to perfect their skills. The camp featured athletes of various abilities, including paraplegics, quadriplegics, amputees, and vision-impaired skiers from across the country.

Casey Owens, a 24-year old double amputee and Purple Heart veteran of the war in Iraq called the camp a "challenging experience." Owens, of Houston, Texas, said he is hoping to attend the event again, and ended up accompanying the Adaptive Adventures Team to Grand Junction for a few more days of wakeboarding before returning home to Texas. Owens was also present at Steamboat's first All Mountain Adaptive Ski Camp in March, and has set his eyes to adventure in the 'Boat permanently.

A highlight of the camp was Vinny DelaCruz, who was in Steamboat Springs visiting his daughter. DelaCruz was left a quadriplegic after a car accident three years ago and has recently started traveling and testing his abilities in his wheelchair. He heard about the camp through a local newspaper article and decided to come watch the skiers and wakeboarders. But little did he know this isn't a watching sport! DelaCruz ended up skiing himself, touching the hearts of volunteers at the camp with his huge smile and enthusiastic spirit that even included a wave to his wife in the boat ahead of him. Stories like Owens and DelaCruz are what make events like this one worthwhile.

"A big reason for the strong local support and success of Adaptive Adventures' two major ski events in Steamboat is the dedication and motivation of local residents Craig Kennedy and Andy Jehn and their company, Access Anything," commented Joel Berman, executive director of Adaptive Adventures. Kennedy was paralyzed in a skiing accident in 1996, and received huge local support for events and accessibility improvements in the community. Access Anything has helped the city of Steamboat, as well as the city's ski area, make monumental strides towards universal design and accessibility in the city's parks, ski area buildings, local restaurants, shops, and lodging properties. The town's support shines through when adaptive camps are brought to the area, with generous donations from local business owners that are used to house and feed participants. With continued local donations and larger corporate sponsors, Adaptive Adventures and Access Anything hope to continue organizing quality events in Steamboat.

In addition to the water ski and wakeboard camp, Steamboat is home to the newest annual all mountain adaptive ski camp in the Adaptive Adventures All Mountain Series, also co-sponsored by Adaptive Adventures and Access Anything, and the Adaptive World Cup Championships. Started in 2005, the Championships will return to Steamboat in 2007. Hosting these camps provides the fulfillment and joy of seeing others, like DelaCruz and Owens, get out there and execute Access Anything's motto: Go Anywhere, Do Anything!

Craig Kennedy and Andrea Jehn also co-authored the first adventure travel guide for people with disabilities, *Access Anything: Colorado, Adventuring with Disabilities*, released in July 2005. This launched the couple into a 3-year quest of discovering what adventures lies beyond Steamboat for people with disabilities. The guidebook includes all nine adaptive programs at ski areas around the state, as well as hunting and fishing options, additional activity providers such as jeeping and atv rides, scenic drives, state and national parks, and small town highlights.

Volunteer Spotlight - Scott Smit

Scott Smit is all about giving back. Scott met Adaptive Adventures co-founder Matt Feeney in the summer of 2000 while volunteering for the Denver Parks and Recreation Special Needs Program. When he heard about Adaptive Adventures and what the organization was trying to do, Scott wanted to get more involved. Since then, he has been a key ingredient in the growth of the water sports program.

The first two years Scott helped to organize and implement several new clinics, camps, and even competitive events. In addition to volunteering a huge amount of his own time and resources, Scott has also been instrumental in recruiting several top volunteers. Recently, Scott agreed to take on an even greater role in the organization as the Adaptive Adventures Water Sports Coordinator, despite the fact that it is an unpaid position. "Scottie is tireless," said Program Director, Matt Feeney. "He brings so much positive energy to the water sports program and is directly responsible for the success and growth of the program."

Scott is never satisfied with the status quo and is always looking to help a greater number of individuals with disabilities. The past two years, he has helped Matt to expand our water-ski camp opportunities from one camp to five in 2006. "We need to expand and have more programs in Colorado and in other states to facilitate water sports for people with disabilities," noted Smit. "Working with children and now recently injured armed forces personnel has given me greater energy to continue growing the program and reaching out to more people. I feel like I often get more than I give volunteering for Adaptive Adventures." Scott is currently developing funding relationships to make his dream of providing more opportunities a reality in the next few years.

In addition to being an awesome resource for water sports, Scott has always been on hand to help with any of Adaptive's programs. An expert snow skier, Scott has helped at the Hartford Ski Spectacular and our All Mountain camps in the winter for the past five years. His passion for the outdoors is evident whether he's pulling adaptive skiers behind his ski boat or assisting a mono-skier on the chairlift. Keep up the good work, Scott!



Athlete Spotlight: Greta Neimanas - Age 18

We first had the pleasure of meeting Greta Neimanas in 2001, when Adaptive Adventures first started offering adaptive sports opportunities in Chicago. Greta began playing soccer at the age of six and has come to enjoy engaging in outdoor sports and activities such as kayaking, rock climbing, and wakeboarding through programs at the Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago (RIC) and Adaptive Adventures. Just last month, Greta joined our group for a trip to Orlando, Fla for the Extremity Games, where she competed in wakeboarding and rock climbing.

But it was a trip to the 2004 Paralympic Games in Athens, Greece, that introduced her to a different side of something she had been doing recreationally for years – cycling. Greta, who was born without her left arm below the elbow, was one of six physically disabled kids who earned a trip to Athens by submitting a winning essay as part of the Paralympic Academy program. "I've always had an interest in cycling, so I was like, 'Hey! This is really cool! I can take this somewhere,'" Greta commented with her usual infectious smile.



In the area of competitive cycling Greta, has made great strides in a short period of time. Within a year of starting her competitive career, Greta was invited to a U.S. Paralympics National Team camp last November. At the 2006 U.S. Paralympics Cycling National Championships this July, she took another large stride, winning the bronze medal in the Women's Road Time Trial event. That performance, combined with a couple solid runs on the track, earned her a spot on the squad that will represent the U.S. at the 2006 IPC Cycling World Championships, Sept. 7-17 in Aigle, Switzerland. Greta has modest expectations for her first international event, "I'm not expecting to win anything because it's just my second season," she noted. "I just want to get the experience right now. I just want to go and race." Getting involved has led Greta to experiences like wakeboarding competitively, kayaking, and becoming an award-winning scuba diver, among others. She will be a freshman this fall at Indiana University, where she will study for a degree in therapeutic recreation, a field where she may have the chance to provide such experiences for other disabled youth. For the past several summers, Greta has volunteered her time and positive attitude to help other kids with disabilities at numerous camps, clinics, and events.

7th Annual Rocky Mountain Cycling Omnium

Adaptive Adventures was proud to host the 7th annual Rocky Mountain Cycling Omnium (RMO). This year's event featured the American Cycling Association's Colorado State Criterium Championship and many of the best cyclists from Colorado and the U.S.! The RMO is a unique event that pairs able-bodied amateur and professional cyclists with disabled cyclists riding on the same courses and racing in front of the same crowds. The event brought athletes of all abilities together for a weekend of learning, empowerment, and fun. The weather at this year's RMO was stellar, a far cry from 2005, and the event included 676 athletes.

The 2006 RMO also generated the biggest field in the inaugural American Handcycle Series. California's Alejandro Albor proved why he's the best in the world by dominating every race, and making the [Paralympic Team] elite standard at the time trial. The three-day cycling race -- which included twelve different race categories for cyclists of all abilities -- featured a time-trial, road race, and a Criterium finale through the downtown streets of historic Old Town Golden, where crowds gathered to cheer on the cyclists.

The RMO is sponsored by Boeing, Gary Williams Energy, Argus, Coors Light, Lodo Restaurant Group, Garceworks, Invacare Top End, and the Table Mountain Inn. Biking across the state of Colorado and through the winding roads of the Rocky Mountains is a rather challenging feat. Doing so on a handcycle is quite another. Just ask Colorado Springs resident Drew Wills. Along with his wife, Jeanie, and their son, Stephen, Drew participated in the 11th Annual Bicycle Tour of Colorado this past June, a 470-mile, weeklong ride through the Rockies. Beginning and ending in Pagosa Springs, the Tour included stops in Creede, Gunnison, Montrose, Telluride, and Mancos, as well as scenic Wolf Creek Pass, the Blue Mesa Reservoir, and the Dallas Divide.

Drew was injured in a skiing accident in Aspen on Dec. 30, 2004. With a broken back and severed spinal cord, it was an accident that left him paralyzed and facing months of rehabilitation. Drew attended therapeutic recreation (T-Rec) programs at Craig Hospital in Denver, a world-renown facility specializing in rehabilitation for people with severe spinal cord and brain injuries. T-Rec Specialist Claire Cahow worked directly with Drew throughout his rehabilitation, and Drew says it was Cahow who got him interested in handcycling. Soon after his release from Craig in April 2005, and amazingly less than

6 months after his injury, Drew, Jeanie, Stephen, and daughter Krista entered the family's first Bicycle Tour as part of the Adaptive Adventures Cycling Team.

"The Bike Tour has been a great way for our family to get together and enjoy the Rockies and all of the scenery that comes with it," says Drew. "As part of the Adaptive Adventures (AA) cycling team, it's important to me that I help create awareness for adaptive cycling as well as the opportunities that are out there today for individuals to ride, such as the Bike Tour, which offer adaptive athletes full support throughout the event from the AA and Bike Tour staff and volunteers, such as Claire."

2006 was the third year that AA partnered with the Bicycle Tour of Colorado and the fourth year the organization has brought a cycling team to the event. Ranging from 20 to 25 cyclists, AA team members receive jerseys, hotel lodging at each day's stop, and specialized support. Besides the Bicycle Tour, AA also offers cycling clinics, group rides, training programs, and other AA-sponsored cycling events throughout the summer to adaptive athletes of any ability.

Now that Drew is back working full-time, he and Jeanie find it best to train in the morning hours, and do so roughly five times a week. During the winter months, Drew works at home on his trainer, which he built last winter and adapted so it works as a handcycle. But once the spring air arrives, Drew and Jeanie hit the streets. In preparation for this year's Tour, Drew and Jeanie participated in the 8th Annual Buena Vista Bike Festival, a century (100 mile) ride in May. The route includes the scenic hills of Turquoise Lake road and through the historic Leadville Mining District.

"I had never done a century ride before and I really enjoyed it," says Jeanie.

"It was a good opportunity for us to train for the Bicycle Tour as well as just spend the day together as husband and wife and doing what we enjoy. Riding has been a great outlet for Drew, mentally and physically, and the shared experience has brought us closer together as a family."

Stephen, a senior cross country runner at Williams College in Mass. agrees that the Bicycle Tour has been a good family bonding experience and says that riding has really helped his dad throughout the recovery process.

"Growing up, the time I spent on a bike was always with my dad, and so after his accident I really didn't envision that it would ever happen again. Then I saw him at Craig on the handcycles and I knew it was just a matter of time until he'd be back in the seat again," says Stephen. "While I enjoy the ride and spending time with my family, it has also been really inspiring to me to hang out and meet other Adaptive athletes participating in the Tour. It's certainly enough to make me want to sign up again next year."

"The annual Bicycle Tour is not only a challenge, but a celebration of all the riding my family and other AA cycling team members have done in preparation for the race," adds Drew. "It's certainly not easy and everybody in our group gets strained at one point or another, but that's when you find out who you are and what you are made of inside. This Tour promotes self-confidence and fosters new relationships, which attracted me from the beginning, and I look forward to participating on the Adaptive team again next year."

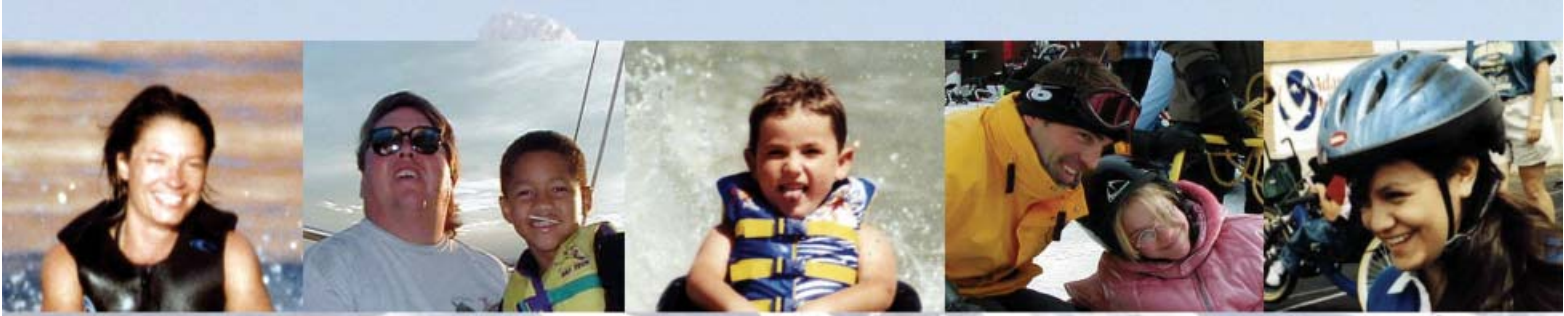
